PROJECT SPOTLIGHT WEST WISCONSIN AVENUE REVITALIZATION CONTINUES WITH TWO REQUESTS FOR PROPOSALS

The Westown neighborhood is anchored by the West Wisconsin Avenue corridor, which is blossoming from the string of recently completed and new projects. More than 550 residential units have been added or are under construction, over 500,000 sq. ft. of obsolete office space has been repurposed to vibrant uses, the SpringHill Suites recently opened, and the Shops of Grand Avenue reinvention plans are gaining momentum. In addition, the neighborhood is home to some of downtown's signature events like the Westown Farmer's Market, River Rhythms, and NEWaukee's Night Market. All of these investments, events and planned projects continue to build and propel the city forward.

Leveraging this momentum, two new Requests for Proposals for projects along the West Wisconsin Avenue Corridor are currently open for submittals.




First, the city of Milwaukee has issued a Request for Proposals for an unprecedented transit-oriented development opportunity. The approximately 2-acre parcel at 4th Street and Wisconsin Avenue is located on both the proposed Milwaukee Streetcar route and Bus Rapid Transit line. This high visibility site is situated across the street from the Wisconsin Center, blocks from the Marguette University campus and centrally-located among several other significant redevelopment efforts. Development concepts should capitalize on this unique site and help continue the momentum in downtown Milwaukee. Proposals will be accepted beginning September 30, 2016. find over 10 lunch vendors, as well as a variety of Wisconsin-grown produce, prepared food and handmade art. The River Rhythms concert series runs Wednesday evenings in Pere Marquette Park from 6:30 to 9 pm and is a great place to meet friends or coworkers after work and listen to a very diverse musical lineup in one of downtown's coolest public spaces on the Milwaukee River.

Westown is also working to raise funds to restore the Court of Honor monuments in the boulevard on West Wisconsin Avenue near Central Library that date back to the late 1800's. The George Washington monument was recently removed for off-site restoration in mid-July. Many downtown stakeholders and others supportive of historic preservation and public art have contributed to the project over the past three years. To raise additional dollars for the project, the Riverfront Loft Condos are holding an event with InTandem Theatre called Five after 5 on Monday, August 1 from 5 to 8 pm. Five condos will feature a sneak peek of InTandem's upcoming season along with food and drink from downtown businesses. How is the revitalization of West Wisconsin Avenue important to the larger renaissance underway in downtown Milwaukee?

The perception of West Wisconsin Avenue and Westown have always been intertwined, so the current momentum on the Avenue is exciting but also critical to the continued prosperity of all of downtown. From the new ownership's plans for Grand Avenue, Marquette's Athletic Performance Research Center, the current RFP for development of the Fourth and Wisconsin surface lot, Newaukee's Night Markets, the extension of the streetcar and bus rapid transit proposal, there's a lot of excitement around the future of West Wisconsin right now.

What other projects are key to keep the positive downtown momentum going? The new arena project was definitely a homerun for the city, but having a modern and expanded convention center will be an important priority moving forward. The development of the Fourth and Wisconsin surface lot into a demand-generating private development that integrates transit and public space is also critical.

What do you see as Milwaukee's biggest challenge?

The development activity downtown is exciting and very important for the city's tax base, but I'm excited to be a part of conversations on how this prosperity can be

leveraged in other parts of the city. The directors of the City's 30+ business improvement districts have a long history of collaboration and sharing information, but there are also larger conversations about this going on as a part of the MKE United initiative of which I'm excited to participate in, and it will involve more public and stakeholder input over the course of the next year.

What peer cities do you believe offer the best qualities for Milwaukee to learn from? I enjoy visiting peer cities to see how they are evolving in comparison to Milwaukee and will be checking out Kansas City later this summer to ride their new streetcar system. There are cities that have similar walkability challenges like Milwaukee due to their spread out layout such as Portland, Oregon. Portland dealt with this challenge early on by implementing and investing in a significant public transportation system to make it easier to get around. It will be exciting to see how the streetcar and proposed bus rapid transit will impact the connectivity of the different areas of downtown Milwaukee as well as the neighborhoods moving forward. A city like Indianapolis shows how important investing in a modern, expanded convention center is to the economic health of their downtown area. On the flip side, the growth in Milwaukee's downtown residential density is outpacing many of our peer cities, which is definitely changing the dynamic of downtown in the evening and on weekends.
